Opening Sentence

First Reading

Lector: A reading from *Much Beloved Daughter*.

In 1948, Li Tim Oi was given an opportunity to leave her own parochial concerns and see something of the wider world. She went as the only woman in a party of eight Chinese clergy led by Bishop Halward to the United States of America.

‘I organized the local people to run the church in my absence, and the Archdeacon visited from time to time to celebrate Holy Communion. I was away for eight months.’

Bishop Hall had decided to send a small party from the diocese for two reasons. First, many of the clergy, including Li Tim Oi, needed a rest after the rigors of war. Secondly, Bishop Hall saw political trouble ahead in China and wanted his clergy to be rested ready to deal with the trials ahead and to have a wider view of the world, so as to be able to put the political changes in China into a wider perspective.

‘Bishop Hall knew that one day the liberation would arrive. He took the chance to send us to have a holiday, but also to explore new ideas we might be able to adapt for use in a new China.’

... The clergy traveling with Li Tim Oi well knew that she was an ordained priest, but before leaving for America Li Tim Oi was given strict instructions by Bishop Halward to keep this fact hidden.

'He told me, you must not tell anyone you are an ordained priest and you must not preach or make any public statements.' It was the year of the Lambeth Conference, and her ordination was very much a talking point in Church circles.

'I was told to keep quiet,' Li Tim Oi remembers, and keeping true to her vows as a priest she obeyed her bishop. 'But why,' she admits having asked herself, 'am I so peculiar? Why should it be so strange that I am a priest and a woman?'

although she fully intended to keep her vow of obedience, it was impossible. As soon as the ship docked at San Francisco, after the Pacific crossing, Li Tim Oi Was met by one of her old teachers, the Rev. Tam Chao Tin.

'He met me at the quayside.' "Li Tim Oi," he said, "this coming Sunday we have arranged for you to preach at our church." I was allowed to accept the invitation.'

Second Reading

Reader A reading from the Gospel of Luke (10:1-9).

After this the Lord appointed seventy others and sent them on ahead of him in pairs to every town and place where he himself intended to go. He said to them, 'The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore ask the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest. Go on your way. See, I am sending you out like lambs into the midst of wolves. Carry no purse, no bag, no sandals; and greet no one on the road. Whatever house you enter, first say, "Peace to this house!" And if anyone is there who shares in peace, your peace will rest on that person; but if not, it will return to you. Remain in the same house, eating and drinking whatever they provide, for the laborer deserves to be paid. Do not move about from house to house. Whenever you enter a town and its people welcome you, eat what is set before you; cure the sick who are there, and say to them, "The kingdom of God has come near to you."
