Lector A reading from the letter of Paul to the Romans (15:4-13).

Whatever was written in former days was written for our instruction, so that by steadfastness and by the encouragement of the scriptures we might have hope. May the God of steadfastness and encouragement

grant you to live in harmony with one another, in accordance with Christ Jesus, so that together you may with one voice glorify the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Welcome one another, therefore, just as Christ has welcomed you, for the glory of God. For I tell you that Christ has become a servant of the circumcised on behalf of the truth of God in order that he might confirm the promises given to the patriarchs, and in order that the Gentiles might glorify God for his mercy. As it is written,

"Therefore I will confess you among the Gentiles, and sing praises to your name";

and again he says,

"Rejoice, O Gentiles, with his people";

and again,

"Praise the Lord, all you Gentiles, and let all the peoples praise him";

and again Isaiah says,


"The root of Jesse shall come,

The Gospel

Deacon or Presider The Holy Gospel of our Savior Jesus Christ according to Matthew (3:1-12).

In those days John the Baptist appeared in the wilderness of Judea, proclaiming, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near." This is the one of whom the prophet Isaiah spoke when he said,

"The voice of one crying out in the wilderness:

'Prepare the way of the Lord,

make his paths straight.""

Now John wore clothing of camel's hair with a leather belt around his waist, and his food was locusts and wild honey. Then the people of Jerusalem and all Judea were going out to him, and all the region along the Jordan, and they were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins.

But when he saw many Pharisees and Sadducees coming for baptism, he said to them, "You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the wrath to come? Bear fruit worthy of repentance. Do not presume to say to yourselves, 'We have Abraham as our ancestor'; for I tell you, God is able from these stones to raise up children to Abraham. Even now the ax is lying at the root of the trees; every tree therefore that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire.

"I baptize you with water for repentance, but one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to carry his sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowing fork is in his hand, and he will clear his threshing floor and will gather his wheat into the granary; but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire."


Presider

The Body of Christ, the bread of heaven; The Blood of Christ, the cup of salvation.


During Communion, those present via Zoom are encouraged to pray the following prayer for Spiritual Communion that we have shared together throughout the pandemic:

Amen.



Extended Advent

Sunday, November 9, we began our observance of an extended seven-week Advent. This expanded Advent is part of a movement to observe Advent with greater intentionality, even as we continue to use the same readings assigned by the lectionary to the wider church. You can read the <u>rationale for this movement on the website of the Advent Project</u> or in <u>What Are We Waiting For: Reimagining Advent for Time to Come</u> by William Peterson. In a context where (a secularized) Christmas culture lurks everywhere – even before Halloween now! – an extended Advent <u>resists this spread</u>, <u>and its mischaracterization of the season</u>. Advent is not simply a countdown to Christmas. It is an embrace of the in-breaking reign of God. We share a longer Advent observance <u>with our Greek Orthodox neighbors</u>, even as other Christian denominations take on this spirit of intentionality with slightly different framings: this part of the church year <u>has been called Kingdomtide in some Protestant traditions</u> and liturgical calendar of the Church of England is now in countdown to Advent, calling this Sunday the "Fourth Sunday Before Advent" (you can look at their church calendar <u>online here</u>). Welcome to Advent.

Several local organizations offer opportunities to stand with immigrants facing Trump administration attacks.

Faith in Action(www.faithinactionba.org): Local branch of a national community-organizing group anchored in faith communities around the country. In the Bay Area they focus on housing and immigration. Opportunities include:

- Immigration Court. Accompany immigrants to their court hearings. You'll need at least conversational Spanish, and you'll be trained before you get started. For more information and the sign-up link: www.faithinactionba.org/accompaniment.
- Rapid Response Network (203) 666-4472: Faith in Action operates the San Mateo County Rapid Response phone network, providing information for immigrants and their supporters in the whole Bay Area, not just San Mateo. Call the number:
 - o If you or a loved one has been detained by ICE
 - o If you learn that someone has been detained by immigration enforcement
 - o If you see ICE activity in the community
 - o If you need accompaniment at an ICE Check-In or court appearance
 - o If you need support filling out your asylum paperwork within the first year of entering the country
 - o If you think immigration enforcement is contacting you by phone call or text message

Immigration court demonstrations and vigils: Several groups maintain a presence outside the immigration court at 100 Montgomery in downtown SF. Here are a couple:

Sign-on Letter to the Presiding Bishop

Several weeks ago a group of St. Aidanites met to reflect upon this moment in history, the impact of this political moment on our lives and relationships, and what ways we are called to act in response. Between the 8 and 10 AM services as well as after the 10 AM service, we have now met twice. At the second such meeting, the group used Presiding Bishop Sean Rowe's July 4th op ed, published in *Religion News Service*, as a grounding text for reflection. During that conversation the group decided to write to the Presiding Bishop thanking him for the boldness of his words and asking him to please continue speaking out, inviting more Christians to be "engines of resistance," bearing witness to the values of God's just reign.
