




# Lighting of the Advent Wreath

#### Psalm 98

The Deacon or Presider introduces the Psalm and reads the Antiphon. All join in reading the bolded text.

# The Second Reading

Lector A reading from the letter to the 2 Thessalonians (3:6-13).

Now we command you, beloved, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, to keep away from believers who are living in idleness and not according to the tradition that they received from us. For you yourselves know how you ought to imitate us; we were not idle when we were with you, and we did not eat anyone's bread without paying for it; but with toil and labor we worked night and day, so that we might not burden any of you. This was not because we do not have that right, but in order to give you an example to imitate. For even when we were with you, we gave you this command: Anyone unwilling to work should not eat. For we hear that some of you are living in idleness, mere busybodies, not doing any work. Now such persons we command and exhort in the Lord Jesus Christ to do their work quietly and to earn their own living. Kindred, do not be weary in doing what is right.



# The Gospel

Deacon or Presider The Holy Gospel of our Savior Jesus Christ according to Luke (21:5-19).

People Glory to you, O Christ.

When some were speaking about the temple, how it was adorned with beautiful stones and gifts dedicated to God, Jesus said, "As for these things that you see, the days will come when not one stone will be left upon another; all will be thrown down."

They asked him, "Teacher, when will this be, and what will be the sign that this is about to take place?" And he said, "Beware that you are not led astray; for many will come in my name and say, 'I am he!' and, 'The time is near!' Do not go after them.

"When you hear of wars and insurrections, do not be terrified; for these things must take place first, but the end will not follow immediately." Then he said to them, "Nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom; there will be great earthquakes, and in various places famines and plagues; and there will be dreadful portents and great signs from heaven.

"But before all this occurs, they will arrest you and persecute you; they will hand you over to synagogues and prisons, and you will be brought before kings and governors because of my name. This will give you an opportunity to testify. So make up your minds not to prepare your defense in advance; for I will give you words and a wisdom that none of your opponents will be able to withstand or contradict. You will be betrayed even by parents and brothers, by relatives and friends; and they will put some of you to death. You will be hated by all because of my name. But not a hair of your head will perish. By your endurance you will gain your souls."

#### Presider



# **Announcements**

#### **Extended Advent**

Sunday, November 9, we began our observance of an extended seven-week Advent. This expanded Advent is part of a movement to observe Advent with greater intentionality, even as we continue to use the same readings assigned by the lectionary to the wider church. You can read the rationale for this movement on the website of the Advent Project or in What Are We Waiting For: Reimagining Advent for Time to Come by William Peterson. In a context where (a secularized) Christmas culture lurks everywhere – even before Halloween now! – an extended Advent resists this spread, and its mischaracterization of the season. Advent is not simply a countdown to Christmas. It is an embrace of the in-breaking reign of God. We share a longer Advent observance with our Greek Orthodox neighbors, even as other Christian denominations take on this spirit of intentionality with slightly different framings: this part of the church year has been called Kingdomtide in some Protestant traditions and liturgical calendar of the Church of England is now in countdown to Advent, calling this Sunday the "Fourth Sunday Before Advent" (you can look at their church calendar online here). Welcome to Advent.

#### Action Opportunities in Support of Trans Rights This Week

There are two upcoming opportunities for solidarity with the trans and non-binary community, both in observance of Trans Day of Remembrance (TDOR):

- Today, Sunday, November 16, the 6 PM service at Grace Cathedral will mark Trans Day Of Rememberance, including special prayers of the people, confession, and preaching
- This **Thursday, November 20**, there will be a TDOR rally at the SF City Hall steps at 5 PM, followed by a march to the SF LGBTQ Center on Market Street from 6-6:30 PM, with a program that will begin at 7 PM. SF Transmarch has described the event as follows: "On November 20th (Thursday) we invite our community, friends, and allies for our annual Trans Day of Remembrance celebration to honor and remember our lost trans elders and siblings, and recharge the people to fight against oppression.

This years theme is 'Stages of Grief,' where we create and share space to collectively mourn, imagine, and strive for a future where all peoples are liberated from systematic repression.

As transgender and gender non-conforming people continue to face unprecedented rates of state sanctioned discrimination, harassment, and fatal violence across the globe, we believe that community is the path to safety. Join us this November."

#### PEOPLE OF PEACE: Grounding Ourselves in Nonviolence

Four Zoom sessions, beginning Wednesday November 12

#### 6:30 p.m. Evening Prayer; 7 – 8:15 Program

Amid the turbulence of our current political climate, we hear a lot about "peaceful protests" and "nonviolent resistance." For the most part, our public conversation uses the term nonviolence to indicate merely the absence of something, rather than the presence of a courageous and active spiritual practice that confronts evil with love. In our Advent Wednesday evening series this year, we will ground ourselves in nonviolence by exploring the work of leaders whose faith has shaped and led this living tradition. ## Opportunities for Solidarity with Immigrants

Several local organizations offer opportunities to stand with immigrants facing Trump administration attacks.

**Faith in Action**(www.faithinactionba.org): Local branch of a national community-organizing group anchored in faith communities around the country. In the Bay Area they focus on housing and immigration. Opportunities include:

- Immigration Court. Accompany immigrants to their court hearings. You'll need at least conversational Spanish, and you'll be trained before you get started. For more information and the sign-up link: www.faithinactionba.org/accompaniment.
- Rapid Response Network (203) 666-4472: Faith in Action operates the San Mateo County Rapid Response phone network, providing information for immigrants and their supporters in the whole Bay Area, not just San Mateo. Call the number:
  - o If you or a loved one has been detained by ICE
  - o If you learn that someone has been detained by immigration enforcement
  - o If you see ICE activity in the community
  - o If you need accompaniment at an ICE Check-In or court appearance
  - o If you need support filling out your asylum paperwork within the first year of entering the country
  - o If you think immigration enforcement is contacting you by phone call or text message

**Immigration court demonstrations and vigils:** Several groups maintain a presence outside the immigration court at 100 Montgomery in downtown SF. Here are a couple:

### Sign-on Letter to the Presiding Bishop

Several weeks ago a group of St. Aidanites met to reflect upon this moment in history, the impact of this political moment on our lives and relationships, and what ways we are called to act in response. Between the 8 and 10 AM services as well as after the 10 AM service, we have now met twice. At the second such meeting, the group used Presiding Bishop Sean Rowe's July 4th op ed, published in *Religion News Service*, as a grounding text for reflection. During that conversation the group decided to write to the Presiding Bishop thanking him for the boldness of his words and asking him to please continue speaking out, inviting more Christians to be "engines of resistance," bearing witness to the values of God's just reign.
