



Opening Acclamation

The Collect of the Day

Presider God be with you.

Almighty God, whom truly to know is everlasting life: Grant us so perfectly to know your Son Jesus Christ to be the way, the truth, and the life, that we may steadfastly follow his steps in the way that leads to eternal life; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who lives and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

The First Reading

Lector A reading from the Acts of the Apostles (8:26-40).

An angel of the Lord said to Philip, "Get up and go toward the south to the road that goes down from Jerusalem to Gaza." (This is a wilderness road.) So he got up and went. Now there was an Ethiopian eunuch, a court official of the Candace, queen of the Ethiopians, in charge of her entire treasury. He had come to Jerusalem to worship and was returning home; seated in his chariot, he was reading the prophet Isaiah. Then the Spirit said to Philip, "Go over to this chariot and join it." So Philip ran up to it and heard him reading the prophet Isaiah. He asked, "Do you understand what you are reading?" He replied, "How

can I, unless someone guides me?" And he invited Philip to get in and sit beside him. Now the passage of the scripture that he was reading was this:

"Like a sheep he was led to the slaughter, and like a lamb silent before its shearer, so he does not open his mouth.

In his humiliation justice was denied him.

Who can describe his generation?

For his life is taken away from the earth."

The eunuch asked Philip, "About whom, may I ask you, does the prophet say this, about himself or about someone else?" Then Philip began to speak, and starting with this scripture, he proclaimed to him the good news about Jesus. As they were going along the road, they came to some water; and the eunuch said, "Look, here is water! What is to prevent me from being baptized?" He commanded the chariot to stop, and both of them, Philip and the eunuch, went down into the water, and Philip baptized him. When they came up out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord snatched Philip away; the eunuch saw him no more, and went on his way rejoicing. But Philip found himself at Azotus, and as he was passing through the region, he proclaimed the good news to all the towns until he came to Caesarea.

Psalm 22:24-30

The Deacon or officiant introduces the Psalm and reads the Antiphon at the beginning and ending of the Psalm. All join in reading the bolded text.

 I will perform my vows in the presence of those who worship you.
- 25 The poor shall eat and be satisfied, and those who seek you shall praise you;*
 "May your heart live for ever!"
- 26 All the ends of the earth shall remember and turn to God,* and all the families of the nations shall bow before you.
- 27 For sovereignty belongs to God;* who rules over the nations.
- 28 To you alone all who sleep in the earth bow down in worship;* all who go down to the dust fall before you.
- 29 My soul shall live for you; my descendants shall serve you;* they shall be known as God's people for ever.
- 30 They shall come and make known to a people yet unborn* the saving deeds that you have done.

Antiphon We beheld him despised and rejected, a man of sorrows, and acquainted with grief.

The Second Reading

Lector A reading from the first letter of John (4:7-21).

Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love. God's love was revealed among us in this way: God sent his only Son into the world so that we might live through him. In this is love, not that we loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the atoning sacrifice for our sins. Beloved, since

God loved us so much, we also ought to love one another. No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God lives in us, and his love is perfected in us.

By this we know that we abide in him and he in us, because he has given us of his Spirit. And we have seen and do testify that the Father has sent his Son as the Savior of the world. God abides in those who confess that Jesus is the Son of God, and they abide in God. So we have known and believe the love that God has for us.

God is love, and those who abide in love abide in God, and God abides in them. Love has been perfected among us in this: that we may have boldness on the day of judgment, because as he is, so are we in this world. There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear; for fear has to do with punishment, and whoever fears has not reached perfection in love. We love because he first loved us. Those who say, "I love God," and hate their brothers or sisters, are liars; for those who do not love a brother or sister whom they have seen, cannot love God whom they have not seen. The commandment we have from him is this: those who love God must love their brothers and sisters also.

Jesus said to his disciples, "I am the true vine, and my Father is the vinegrower. He removes every branch in me that bears no fruit. Every branch that bears fruit he prunes to make it bear more fruit. You have already been cleansed by the word that I have spoken to you. Abide in me as I abide in you. Just as the branch cannot bear fruit by itself unless it abides in the vine, neither can you unless you abide in me. I am the vine, you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing. Whoever does not abide in me is thrown away like a branch and withers; such branches are gathered, thrown into the fire, and burned. If you abide in me, and my words abide in you, ask for whatever you wish, and it will be done for you. My Father is glorified by this, that you bear much fruit and become my disciples."

We know that new volunteers may have concerns about dealing with difficult individuals after a disaster. This session will discuss the importance of being prepared to help someone who is in distress. This involves using a companionate and empathetic response.

We will also introduce the concept of Psychological First Aid (PFA). This recent approach trains volunteers to help keep themselves and fellow volunteers aware of stress that may make our work less effective along with methods of reducing the stress. This will be an introduction to PFA with a more detailed training session on a later date.

Life Crisis/Emergency Form

Living in the Bay Area we're encouraged to have a disaster plan, food/supplies in the event of an earthquake. The End of Life Ministry (ELM) team is aware that an urgent illness, accident or other life altering situation can happen without notice or warning. While we've talked about advance care planning involving end-of-life care choices, there is even more practical helpful information that the clergy would like to have on hand in a crisis, such as:

- Name of spouse/significant other/next of kin, close friends or caregivers and contact information
- Relevant health care information, primary care provider, health insurance company;
- Name/contact information of your health care agent, and
- Physician Order for Life Sustaining Treatment (POLST)

This form will be kept in a confidential file and be available to clergy to aid them in supporting you and your loved ones in time of need. The form is available as a downloadable pdf on the pastoral care page of the parish website and hard copies are also available in the parish office.
