The Liturgy of the Word

Opening Sentences

Presider Bless the God of our salvation:
People ***Who bears our burdens and forgives our sins.***

Confession

Deacon
or Presider Let us confess our sins against God and our neighbor.

A space of silence is kept

God of all mercy, we confess that we have sinned against you, opposing your will in our lives. We have denied your goodness in each other, in ourselves, and in the world you have created. We repent of the evil that enslaves us, the evil we have done and the evil done on our behalf. Forgive, restore and strengthen us through our Savior Jesus Christ that we may abide in your love and serve only your will. Amen.

Presider Almighty God have mercy on you, forgive you all your sins through the grace of Jesus Christ, strengthen you in all goodness, and by the power of the Holy Spirit keep you in eternal life. ***Amen.***

Canticle: God Is Our Refuge and Strength

The Collect of the Day

Presider Hear our cry, O God.

Almighty God, you alone can bring into order the unruly wills and affections of sinners: Grant your people grace to love what you command and desire what you promise; that, among the swift and varied changes of the world, our hearts may surely there be fixed where true joys are to be found; through Jesus Christ our Savior, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

First Reading

Lector A reading from Ezekiel (37:1-14).

The hand of the Lord came upon me, and he brought me out by the spirit of the Lord and set me down in the middle of a valley; it was full of bones. He led me all around them; there were very many lying in the valley, and they were very dry. He said to me, "Mortal, can these bones live?" I answered, "O Lord God, you know." Then he said to me, "Prophesy to these bones, and say to them: O dry bones, hear the word of the Lord. Thus says the Lord God to these bones: I will cause breath to enter you, and you shall live. I will lay sinews on you, and will cause flesh to come upon you, and cover you with skin, and put breath in you, and you shall live; and you shall know that I am the Lord."

So I prophesied as I had been commanded; and as I prophesied, suddenly there was a noise, a rattling, and the bones came together, bone to its bone. I looked, and there were sinews on them, and flesh had come upon them, and skin had covered them; but there was no breath in them. Then he said to me, "Prophesy to the breath, prophesy, mortal, and say to the breath: Thus says the Lord God: Come from the four winds, O breath, and breathe upon these slain, that they may live." I prophesied as he commanded me, and the breath came into them, and they lived, and stood on their feet, a vast multitude.

Then he said to me, "Mortal, these bones are the whole house of Israel. They say, 'Our bones are dried up, and our hope is lost; we are cut off completely.' Therefore prophesy, and say to them, Thus says the Lord God: I am going to open your graves, and bring you up from your graves, O my people; and I will bring you back to the land of Israel. And you shall know that I am the Lord, when I open your graves, and bring you up from your graves, O my people. I will put my spirit within you, and you shall live, and I will place you on your own soil; then you shall know that I, the Lord, have spoken and will act," says the Lord.

Lector Hear what the Spirit is saying to God's People.

People ***Thanks be to God.***

The Deacon or Officiant introduces the Psalm and reads the Antiphon at the beginning and ending of the Psalm. All join in reading the bolded text.

Antiphon With our God there is mercy and plenteous redemption.

- 1 *Out of the depths have I called to you; O God, hear my voice;*
let your ears consider well the voice of my supplication.*
- 2 *If you were to note what is done amiss,* O God, who could stand?*
- 3 *For there is forgiveness with you;* therefore you shall be feared.*
- 4 *I wait for you, O God; my soul waits for you;* in your word is my hope.*
- 5 *My soul waits for you, more than the night-watch for the morning,*
more than the night-watch for the morning.*
- 6 *O Israel, wait for God,* for with our God there is mercy;*
- 7 *With you there is plenteous redemption,*
and you will redeem Israel from all their sins.*

Antiphon With our God there is mercy and plenteous redemption.

Second Reading

Lector A reading from the Letter of Paul to the Romans (8:6-11).

To set the mind on the flesh is death, but to set the mind on the Spirit is life and peace. For this reason the mind that is set on the flesh is hostile to God; it does not submit to God's law-- indeed it cannot, and those who are in the flesh cannot please God.

But you are not in the flesh; you are in the Spirit, since the Spirit of God dwells in you. Anyone who does not have the Spirit of Christ does not belong to him. But if Christ is in you, though the body is dead because of sin, the Spirit is life because of righteousness. If the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead dwells in you, he who raised Christ from the dead will give life to your mortal bodies also through his Spirit that dwells in you.

Lector Hear what the Spirit is saying to God's people.

The Gospel

Deacon The Holy Gospel of our Savior Jesus Christ, according to John (11:1-45).

All **Glory to you, O Christ.**

Now a certain man was ill, Lazarus of Bethany, the village of Mary and her sister Martha. Mary was the one who anointed the Lord with perfume and wiped his feet with her hair; her brother Lazarus was ill. So the sisters sent a message to Jesus, "Lord, he whom you love is ill." But when Jesus heard it, he said, "This illness does not lead to death; rather it is for God's glory, so that the Son of God may be glorified through it." Accordingly, though Jesus loved Martha and her sister and Lazarus, after having heard that Lazarus was ill, he stayed two days longer in the place where he was.

Then after this he said to the disciples, "Let us go to Judea again." The disciples said to him, "Rabbi, the Judeans were just now trying to stone you, and are you going there again?" Jesus answered, "Are there not twelve hours of daylight? Those who walk during the day do not stumble, because they see the light of this

world. But those who walk at night stumble, because the light is not in them.” After saying this, he told them, “Our friend Lazarus has fallen asleep, but I am going there to awaken him.” The disciples said to him, “Lord, if he has fallen asleep, he will be all right.” Jesus, however, had been speaking about his death, but they thought that he was referring merely to sleep. Then Jesus told them plainly, “Lazarus is dead. For your sake I am glad I was not there, so that you may believe. But let us go to him.” Thomas, who was called the Twin, said to his fellow disciples, “Let us also go, that we may die with him.”

When Jesus arrived, he found that Lazarus had already been in the tomb four days. Now Bethany was near Jerusalem, some two miles away, and many of the Judaeans had come to Martha and Mary to console them about their brother. When Martha heard that Jesus was coming, she went and met him, while Mary stayed at home. Martha said to Jesus, “Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died. But even now I know that God will give you whatever you ask of him.” Jesus said to her, “Your brother will rise again.” Martha said to him, “I know that he will rise again in the resurrection on the last day.” Jesus said to her, “I am the resurrection and the life. Those who believe in me, even though they die, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?” She said to him, “Yes, Lord, I believe that you are the Messiah, the Son of God, the one coming into the world.”

When she had said this, she went back and called her sister Mary, and told her privately, “The Teacher is here and is calling for you.” And when she heard it, she got up quickly and went to him. Now Jesus had not yet come to the village, but was still at the place where Martha had met him. The Judaeans who were with her in the house, consoling her, saw Mary get up quickly and go out. They followed her because they thought that she was going to the tomb to weep there. When Mary came where Jesus was and saw him, she knelt at his feet and said to him, “Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died.” When Jesus saw her weeping, and the Judaeans who came with her also weeping, he was greatly disturbed in spirit and deeply moved. He said, “Where have you laid him?” They said to him, “Lord, come and see.” Jesus began to weep. So the Judaeans said, “See how he loved him!” But some of them said, “Could not he who opened the eyes of the blind man have kept this man from dying?”

Then Jesus, again greatly disturbed, came to the tomb. It was a cave, and a stone was lying against it. Jesus said, “Take away the stone.” Martha, the sister of the dead man, said to him, “Lord, already there is a stench because he has been dead four days.” Jesus said to her, “Did I not tell you that if you believed, you would see the glory of God?” So they took away the stone. And Jesus looked upward and said, “Father, I thank you for having heard me. I knew that you always hear me, but I have said this for the sake of the crowd standing here, so that they may believe that you sent me.” When he had said this, he cried with a loud voice, “Lazarus, come out!” The dead man came out, his hands and feet bound with strips of cloth, and his face wrapped in a cloth. Jesus said to them, “Unbind him, and let him go.”

Many of the Judaeans therefore, who had come with Mary and had seen what Jesus did, believed in him.

Deacon or Presider reads the names of those who have recently died and invites additional prayers.

People: ***It is well, it is well with my soul.***

Intercessor: We give thanks for all the blessings of this life, knowing that even in times of trial, we may find joy and peace in you, our God.

Deacon or Officiant reads the names of those celebrating birthdays and invites additional prayers

Intercessor: In quiet confidence, we pray to God,
People: ***It is well, it is well with my soul.***

Deacon or Presider: O God, accept the prayers of your people; look with compassion upon us and all who turn to you for help; for you are gracious, O lover of souls, and to you we give glory, this day and always. ***Amen.***

Presider The Peace of God be always with you.
People ***And also with you.***

The Presider continues

Praise and thanksgiving belong to you, God of every blessing, for you created all things to grow and thrive in your dream of a just and loving world of friendly folk beneath a friendly sky.

You called a holy people to share life with you, and when they were captive in Egypt, with a mighty hand and an outstretched arm you brought them out of oppression, through desert trials, into a land of promise.

In time, your Son came among us and walked a wilderness way, enduring temptation and hunger to bring us out of bondage to sin and to taste and see that you, O God, are good.

And so with grateful hearts we praise you, lifting our voices with angels and archangels, and all the company of heaven, as we join their unending hymn:

*Holy, holy, holy, God of power and might,
heaven and earth are full of your glory.
Hosanna in the highest.
Blessed is the one who comes in the name of our God.
Hosanna in the highest.*

God of mercy, you gave your people manna by day in their wilderness wandering, and because no one can live by bread alone, you gave Jesus to be our bread from heaven.

Send your Holy Spirit upon your church to live as a sign of the way you transform this manna into mercy for all.

With your Spirit, bless this bread and this cup, that they may be for us the body and blood of our Savior Jesus Christ; who, at supper with his friends, took bread, gave you thanks, broke the bread, and gave it to them, saying, "Take, eat: this is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup. Again, he gave you thanks and gave it to his friends, saying, "Drink this, all of you: this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for all for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me."

And so we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Christ has died; Christ is risen; Christ will come again.

Faithful God, whose Son did not escape suffering and death but endured and overcame them: bring your people by the way of the cross to the liberating joy of Easter.

Strengthen us to turn from sin and resist evil of every kind. With your mighty hand and outstretched arm, uphold all who are enduring trials, all who know their very lives are at stake. Be with your children who are heavy laden, and all who labor beneath the misuse of power.

Give to your people new courage to live out your call, faithful to your dream for all creation, until the day when in your glory all are transformed and united in one shared, risen life, one holy communion among all the saints with you to whom all glory belongs forever, O God: Source of all Being, Incarnate Word, and Holy Spirit. **AMEN.**

Presider The gifts of God for the people of God. All are welcome at God's table.

*This Altar belongs to God and all are welcome to partake, wherever you are on your journey of faith.
If you choose to not receive the bread and wine, you are also welcome to come forward for a blessing;
simply cross your arms over your chest.*

The bread and wine are given to the communicants with these words:

The Body of Christ, the bread of heaven; The Blood of Christ, the cup of salvation.

Post Communion Prayer

Presider Most loving God, Creator and Redeemer, we give you thanks for this foretaste of your glory.

People ***Through Christ, with Saint Aidan and all your saints, we offer ourselves and our lives to your service. Send us out in the power of your Spirit, to stand in courage with you in your world. We ask this through Jesus Christ, our Redeemer and Liberator. Amen.***

From the ELM Committee: Life Crisis Forms at St. Aidan's

What would happen if you had a medical crisis at church? Whom should we call?

Since timeliness and having relevant information is critical in these situations, it would be helpful for our clergy to know:

- *Your emergency contact – friend, partner, spouse
- *Relevant health information, e.g., allergies, recent surgery or illness
- *Health Care Provider, e.g., Kaiser, Sutter, UCSF, preferred facility
- *Advance Care Planning preferences --- who has a copy of that document

St. Aidan's ELM Committee (End of Life Ministry) recently completed the development of the Life Crisis/Emergency Form as a valuable resource for our clergy. These forms will be kept in a confidential place by clergy.

Hard copies will be available at St. Aidan's for you. Please consider completing one and returning it to Cameron or to Cary, our Parish Administrator, who will pass it on to Cameron.

More Opportunities for Solidarity with Immigrants

Several local organizations offer opportunities to stand with immigrants facing Trump administration attacks.

Faith in Action(www.faithinactionba.org): Local branch of a national community-organizing group anchored in faith communities around the country. In the Bay Area they focus on housing and immigration. Opportunities include:

- **Immigration Court.** Accompany immigrants to their court hearings. You'll need at least conversational Spanish, and you'll be trained before you get started. For more information and the sign-up link: www.faithinactionba.org/accompaniment.
- **Rapid Response Network (203) 666-4472:** Faith in Action operates the San Mateo County Rapid Response phone network, providing information for immigrants and their supporters in the whole Bay Area, not just San Mateo. Call the number:
 - If you or a loved one has been detained by ICE
 - If you learn that someone has been detained by immigration enforcement
 - If you see ICE activity in the community
 - If you need accompaniment at an ICE Check-In or court appearance
 - If you need support filling out your asylum paperwork within the first year of entering the country
 - If you think immigration enforcement is contacting you by phone call or text message

Immigration court demonstrations and vigils: Several groups maintain a presence outside the immigration court at 100 Montgomery in downtown SF. Here are a couple:
