The Collect

The First Reading

Lector A reading from Isaiah (58:1-12).

Shout out, do not hold back!
Lift up your voice like a trumpet!
Announce to my people their rebellion,
to the house of Jacob their sins.
Yet day after day they seek me
and delight to know my ways,
as if they were a nation that practiced righteousness
and did not forsake the ordinance of their God;
they ask of me righteous judgments,
they delight to draw near to God.
“Why do we fast, but you do not see?
Why humble ourselves, but you do not notice?”
Look, you serve your own interest on your fast day,
and oppress all your workers.
Look, you fast only to quarrel and to fight
and to strike with a wicked fist.
Such fasting as you do today
will not make your voice heard on high.
Is such the fast that I choose,
a day to humble oneself?
Is it to bow down the head like a bulrush,
and to lie in sackcloth and ashes?
Will you call this a fast,
a day acceptable to the Lord?
Is not this the fast that I choose:
to loose the bonds of injustice,
to undo the thongs of the yoke,
to let the oppressed go free,
and to break every yoke?
Is it not to share your bread with the hungry,
and bring the homeless poor into your house;
when you see the naked, to cover them,
and not to hide yourself from your own kin?
Then your light shall break forth like the dawn,
and your healing shall spring up quickly;
your vindicator shall go before you,
the glory of the Lord shall be your rear guard.
Then you shall call, and the Lord will answer;
you shall cry for help, and he will say, Here I am.
If you remove the yoke from among you,
the pointing of the finger, the speaking of evil,
if you offer your food to the hungry
and satisfy the needs of the afflicted,
then your light shall rise in the darkness
and your gloom be like the noonday.

The Lord will guide you continually,
and satisfy your needs in parched places,
and make your bones strong;
and you shall be like a watered garden,
like a spring of water,
whose waters never fail.
Your ancient ruins shall be rebuilt;
you shall raise up the foundations of many generations;
you shall be called the repairer of the breach,
the restorer of streets to live in.

Lector Hear what the Spirit is saying to God's people.
All ***Thanks be to God.***

The Deacon or Officiant introduces the Psalm and leads the congregation in the antiphon. All then recite the verses together in unison.

Psalm 112: 1-10

Antiphon Blessed are they who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they shall be satisfied. Hallelujah.

- 1 Happy are they who fear the Most High* and have great delight in God's commandments!***
- 2 Their descendants will be mighty in the land;* the generation of the upright will be blessed.***
- 3 Wealth and riches will be in their house,* and their righteousness will last for ever.***
- 4 Light shines in the darkness for the upright;* the righteous are merciful and full of compassion.***
- 5 It is good for them to be generous in lending* and to manage their affairs with justice.***
- 6 For they will never be shaken;* the righteous will be kept in everlasting remembrance.***
- 7 They will not be afraid of any evil rumors;* their heart is right; they put their trust in God.***
- 8 Their heart is established and will not shrink,* until they see their desire upon their enemies.***
- 9 They have given freely to the poor,*
and their righteousness stands fast for ever; they will hold up their head with honor.***
- 10 The wicked will see it and be angry; they will gnash their teeth and pine away;*
the desires of the wicked will perish.***

The Second Reading

Lector A reading from the First Letter of Paul to the Corinthians (2:1-16).

When I came to you, siblings, I did not come proclaiming the mystery of God to you in lofty words or wisdom. For I decided to know nothing among you except Jesus Christ, and him crucified. And I came to you in weakness and in fear and in much trembling. My speech and my proclamation were not with plausible words of wisdom, but with a demonstration of the Spirit and of power, so that your faith might rest not on human wisdom but on the power of God.

Yet among the mature we do speak wisdom, though it is not a wisdom of this age or of the rulers of this age, who are doomed to perish. But we speak God's wisdom, secret and hidden, which God decreed before the ages for our glory. None of the rulers of this age understood this; for if they had, they would not have crucified the Lord of glory. But, as it is written,

“What no eye has seen, nor ear heard,
nor the human heart conceived,
what God has prepared for those who love him”—

these things God has revealed to us through the Spirit; for the Spirit searches everything, even the depths of God. For what human being knows what is truly human except the human spirit that is within? So also no one comprehends what is truly God's except the Spirit of God. Now we have received not the spirit of the world, but the Spirit that is from God, so that we may understand the gifts bestowed on us by God. And we speak of these things in words not taught by human wisdom but taught by the Spirit, interpreting spiritual things to those who are spiritual.

Those who are unspiritual do not receive the gifts of God's Spirit, for they are foolishness to them, and they are unable to understand them because they are spiritually discerned. Those who are spiritual discern all things, and they are themselves subject to no one else's scrutiny.

“For who has known the mind of the Lord
so as to instruct him?”

But we have the mind of Christ.

The Gospel

Deacon The Holy Gospel of our Savior Jesus Christ according to Matthew (5:13-20).
People ***Glory to you, O Christ.***

Jesus said, “You are the salt of the earth; but if salt has lost its taste, how can its saltiness be restored? It is no longer good for anything, but is thrown out and trampled under foot.

“You are the light of the world. A city built on a hill cannot be hid. No one after lighting a lamp puts it under the bushel basket, but on the lampstand, and it gives light to all in the house. In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven.

“Do not think that I have come to abolish the law or the prophets; I have come not to abolish but to fulfill. For truly I tell you, until heaven and earth pass away, not one letter, not one stroke of a letter, will pass from the law until all is accomplished. Therefore, whoever breaks one of the least of these commandments, and teaches others to do the same, will be called least in the kingdom of heaven; but whoever does them and teaches them will be called great in the kingdom of heaven. For I tell you, unless your righteousness exceeds that of the scribes and Pharisees, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven.”

In hope we seek; we worship; we are transformed.

We are the Magi.

Holder of all mysteries, we give thanks that, like the Magi, we are both the givers and receivers of gifts.

The deacon or presider reads the birthday list and invites additional prayers of gratitude.

In hope we seek; we worship; we are transformed.

We are the Magi.

Deacon or Presider

Mindful of the gifts we have received and the gifts we have to offer, we bring these prayers to you, O God.

Amen.

The Confession and Absolution

Deacon Let us confess our sins against God and our neighbor.

All ***God of all mercy, we confess that we have sinned against you, opposing your will in our lives. We have denied your goodness in each other, in ourselves, and in the world you have created. We repent of the evil that enslaves us, the evil we have done and the evil done on our behalf. Forgive, restore and strengthen us through our Savior Jesus Christ that we may abide in your love and serve only your will. Amen.***

Presider

Almighty God have mercy on you, forgive you all your sins through the grace of Jesus Christ, strengthen you in all goodness, and by the power of the Holy Spirit keep you in eternal life. ***Amen.***

The Peace

Presider Glory to God in the highest, and may God's peace be with you all.

People ***And also with you.***

Presider Arise shine, for your light has come! Let us give thanks with offerings of our life and labor this day.

The Liturgy of the Table

Presider God be with you.
Assembly ***And also with you.***
Presider Lift up your hearts.

Presider Let us give thanks to God.
Assembly ***It is right to give God thanks and praise.***

Blessed are you, O God, our light and our salvation; to you be glory and praise for ever.

From the beginning you have created all things and all your works echo the silent music of your praise. In the fullness of time you made us in your image, connected to all creation.

You give us breath and speech, that with angels and archangels and all the powers of heaven we may find a voice to sing your praise:

***Holy, holy, holy, God of power and might,
heaven and earth are full of your glory.
Hosanna in the highest.
Blessed is the one who comes in the name of our God.
Hosanna in the highest.***

How wonderful the work of your hands, O God. As a mother tenderly gathers her children, you embraced a people as your own. When they turned away and rebelled your love remained steadfast.

From them you raised up Jesus our Savior, born of Mary, to be the living bread, in whom all our hungers are satisfied.

He offered his life for sinners, and with a love stronger than death he opened wide his arms on the cross.

On the night before he died, he came to supper with his friends and, taking bread, he gave you thanks. He broke it and gave it to them, saying, "Take, eat; this is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me."

At the end of supper, taking the cup of wine, he gave you thanks, and said, "Drink this, all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for all for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me."

Great is the mystery of faith:

Christ has died, Christ is risen, Christ will come again.

Holy God, we plead with confidence Jesus' sacrifice made once for all upon the cross; we remember his dying and rising in glory, and we rejoice that he intercedes for us at your right hand.

Pour out your Holy Spirit as we bring before you these gifts of your creation; may they be for us the body and blood of your dear Son.

As we are nourished by these holy things in your presence, form us in the likeness of Christ, and build us into a living temple to your glory.

Bring us at the last with Saint Aidan and all the saints to the vision of that eternal splendor for which you have created us; through Jesus Christ, our Savior, by whom, with whom, and in whom, with all who stand before you in earth and heaven, we worship you, God almighty, in songs of everlasting praise:

Assembly ***Blessing and honor and glory and power be yours for ever and ever. AMEN.***

The Lord's Prayer

Deacon And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,

***God in heaven, hallowed be your name.
Your kingdom come, your will be done,
On earth as in heaven.
Give us today our daily bread.
Forgive us our debts as we forgive our debtors.
Save us from the time of trial, and deliver us from evil.
For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours,
Now and forever. Amen.***

The Fraction

The Presider breaks the bread and says,

Presider We break this bread to share in the Body of Christ.

All ***We who are many are one body, for we all share in the one bread.***

Lifting the bread and cup, together with others serving at the altar, the Presider says,

Presider The gifts of God for the people of God. All are welcome at God's table.

This Altar belongs to God and all are welcome to partake, wherever you are on your journey of faith.

*If you choose to not receive the bread and wine, you are also welcome to come forward for a blessing;
simply cross your arms over your chest.*

The bread and wine are given to the communicants with these words:

The Body of Christ, the bread of heaven; The Blood of Christ, the cup of salvation.

Post Communion Prayer

God of glory, you have nourished us with the bread of life and the cup of salvation; you have united us with Christ and one another; and you have made us one with all your people in heaven and on earth. Now send us forth in the power of your Spirit, that we may proclaim your redeeming love to the world and continue for ever in the risen life of Christ our Savior. Amen.

Healing Prayer

Anyone who wishes is invited to make a request for healing prayer, either for yourself or on behalf of another.

The Presider will then offer a prayer.

Blessing

May Almighty God, who led the Wise Men by the shining of a star to find the Christ, the Light from Light, lead you also, in your pilgrimage, to find God. ***Amen.***

May God, who sent the Holy Spirit to rest upon the Only-begotten at his baptism in the Jordan River, pour out that Spirit on you who have come to the waters of new birth. ***Amen.***

May God, by the power that turned water into wine at the wedding feast at Cana, transform your lives and make glad your hearts. ***Amen.***

And the blessing of God, one holy and undivided Trinity, be upon you and remain with you for ever. ***Amen.***

Dismissal

Deacon Let us go out into the world rejoicing in the power of the Spirit.

All ***Thanks be to God.***

The season of Epiphany is drawing to a close and Lent is rapidly approaching. Come and enter this holy season with Ash Wednesday worship. Imposition of ashes and Communion will take place at 7:30 AM and 7 PM. We look forward to seeing you.

LGBTQ+ task force invites survey input by March 15. Episcopalians are invited to complete a 15- to 20-minute survey offered by the Task Force on LGBTQ+ Inclusion to help the church better understand how it honors the dignity of all people and where work remains to be done.

The 80th General Convention established the task force in 2022, charging it with conducting an audit of how The Episcopal Church has lived into its public commitments affirming the inclusion of LGBTQ+ people. A survey report will be shared with the 82nd General Convention in 2027.

Members across the church—those who are LGBTQ+ and those who are not—are encouraged to share about their experiences with pastoral care, sacramental access, representation in leadership, and institutional accountability.

From the ELM Committee: Life Crisis Forms at St. Aidan's

What would happen if you had a medical crisis at church? Whom should we call?

Since timeliness and having relevant information is critical in these situations, it would be helpful for our clergy to know:

- *Your emergency contact – friend, partner, spouse
- *Relevant health information, e.g., allergies, recent surgery or illness
- *Health Care Provider, e.g., Kaiser, Sutter, UCSF, preferred facility
- *Advance Care Planning preferences --- who has a copy of that document

St. Aidan's ELM Committee (End of Life Ministry) recently completed the development of the Life Crisis/Emergency Form as a valuable resource for our clergy. These forms will be kept in a confidential place by clergy.

Hard copies will be available at St. Aidan's for you. Please consider completing one and returning it to Cameron or to Cary, our Parish Administrator, who will pass it on to Cameron.

More Opportunities for Solidarity with Immigrants

Several local organizations offer opportunities to stand with immigrants facing Trump administration attacks.

Faith in Action(www.faithinactionba.org): Local branch of a national community-organizing group anchored in faith communities around the country. In the Bay Area they focus on housing and immigration. Opportunities include:

- **Immigration Court.** Accompany immigrants to their court hearings. You'll need at least conversational Spanish, and you'll be trained before you get started. For more information and the sign-up link: www.faithinactionba.org/accompaniment.
- **Rapid Response Network (203) 666-4472:** Faith in Action operates the San Mateo County Rapid Response phone network, providing information for immigrants and their supporters in the whole Bay Area, not just San Mateo. Call the number:
 - If you or a loved one has been detained by ICE
 - If you learn that someone has been detained by immigration enforcement
 - If you see ICE activity in the community
 - If you need accompaniment at an ICE Check-In or court appearance
 - If you need support filling out your asylum paperwork within the first year of entering the country
 - If you think immigration enforcement is contacting you by phone call or text message

Immigration court demonstrations and vigils: Several groups maintain a presence outside the immigration court at 100 Montgomery in downtown SF. Here are a couple:

- **Interfaith Court Vigil** (www.im4humanintegrity.org/category/events/): Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday every week. Sponsored by the Interfaith Movement for Human Integrity. Click here to sign up: bit.ly/CourtVigilVolunteer.
- **Tuesday and Friday demonstrations:** Loosely organized, pretty confrontative demonstrations, called by Democratic Socialists of America and others.

Immigration Court Observers: The National Lawyers Guild trains non-lawyers to participate in observing and documenting what happens in immigration courts in S.F. Click here for more information: nlg.org/programs-committees/nlg-sfba-programs/immigration-justice-program/
