Lector A reading from the prophet Jeremiah (4:11-12, 22-28).

At that time it will be said to this people and to Jerusalem: A hot wind comes from me out of the bare heights in the desert toward my poor people, not to winnow or cleanse-- a wind too strong for that. Now it is I who speak in judgment against them.

"For my people are foolish,

 when God restores the fortunes of the people, Jacob will rejoice and Israel will be glad.

Lector A reading from the Letter of Paul to Timothy (1:12-17).

I am grateful to Christ Jesus our Lord, who has strengthened me, because he judged me faithful and appointed me to his service, even though I was formerly a blasphemer, a persecutor, and a man of violence. But I received mercy because I had acted ignorantly in unbelief, and the grace of our Lord overflowed for me with the faith and love that are in Christ Jesus. The saying is sure and worthy of full acceptance, that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners—of whom I am the foremost. But for that very reason I received mercy, so that in me, as the foremost, Jesus Christ might display the utmost

patience, making me an example to those who would come to believe in him for eternal life. To the King of the ages, immortal, invisible, the only God, be honor and glory forever and ever. Amen.

And when he comes home, he calls together his friends and neighbors, saying to them, 'Rejoice with me, for I have found my sheep that was lost.' Just so, I tell you, there will be more joy in heaven over one sinner who repents than over ninety-nine righteous persons who need no repentance.

We hold fast to the words of scripture that guide us, particularly at this time in our world. We remember especially the wisdom of St. Paul's letter to the Romans:

"For I am convinced that neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither the present nor the future, nor any powers, neither height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord." *Amen.*

The Confession

Deacon or Presider Let us confess our sins against God and God's Creation.

A space of silence is kept.

Holy and merciful God, we confess that we have failed to honor you by rightly claiming our kinship with all your creatures. We have walked heavily on your earth, overused and wasted its resources, taken for granted its beauty and abundance, and treated its inhabitants unjustly, holding future generations hostage to our greed. Have mercy on us and forgive us our sin. Renew in us the resolve to keep and conserve your earth as you desire and intend, with grateful and compassionate hearts, through your Son, our Savior Jesus Christ. Amen.

Presider

Almighty God have mercy on you, forgive you all your sins through the grace of Jesus Christ, strengthen you in all goodness, and by the power of the Holy Spirit keep you in eternal life. *Amen*.

Then, in the fullness of time, you sent your eternal Word, made mortal flesh in Jesus. Born into the human family, and dwelling among us, he revealed your glory. Giving himself freely to death on the cross, he triumphed over evil, opening the way of freedom and life.

On the night before he died for us, Our Savior Jesus Christ took bread, and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his friends, and said: "Take, eat: This is my Body which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

As supper was ending, Jesus took the cup of wine, and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said: "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is poured out for you and for all for the forgiveness of sins. Grace Cathedral Eucharist Commemorating the Rev. Phyllis Edwards, who served St. Aidan's in the late 1960s – Today, Sunday, September 14 at 6 PM

A special Eucharist is taking place at Grace Cathedral on Sunday, September 14th at 6 PM, commemorating the life and ministry of the Rev. Phyllis Edwards (1917-2009). Rev. Edwards was the first woman in the history of the Episcopal Church to be recognized as an ordained deacon in a liturgy presided over by Bishop James Pike at Grace Cathedral on September 13, 1965. This service took place five years before General Convention affirmed the ordained ministry of women in the diaconate, and nearly a decade before the ordinations of the Philadelphia Eleven and the Washington Four helped open the doors for the ordination of women to the priesthood. Organized by members of the Bishop's Advisory Group for the 50th Anniversary Triennium of the Ordination of Women, the upcoming service will be presided over by the Rev. Canon Sierra Reyes, with co-preachers the Rev. Drs. Paula Nesbitt and Cameron Partridge. All are warmly invited and encouraged to attend in person. The service will also be live streamed from Grace Cathedral.

St. Aidan's Hosting the Memorial Service of the Rev. Dr. Vicki Gray Sat., September 27 at 2:30 PM, Reception to follow

St. Aidan's will host a memorial service for the Rev. Dr. Vicki Gray, a deacon of our diocese who died on August 3. Bishop Austin Rios will preside, and Cameron will preach. Clergy of the Diocese are invited to vest and wear white stoles and to arrive by 2 PM. The service will also be **livestreamed** on the **DioCal YouTube channel**.

Vicki was well known to some of you, and perhaps not known to others of you, but she was truly amazing and it is an honor for us to host her service.

Sign-on Letter to the Presiding Bishop

Several weeks ago a group of St. Aidanites met to reflect upon this moment in history, the impact of this political moment on our lives and relationships, and what ways we are called to act in response. Between the 8 and 10 AM services as well as after the 10 AM service, we have now met twice. At the second such meeting, the group used Presiding Bishop Sean Rowe's July 4th op ed, published in *Religion News Service*, as a grounding text for reflection. During that conversation the group decided to write to the Presiding Bishop thanking him for the boldness of his words and asking him to please continue speaking out, inviting more Christians to be "engines of resistance," bearing witness to the values of God's just reign. Several local organizations offer opportunities to stand with immigrants facing Trump administration attacks.

Faith in Action(www.faithinactionba.org): Local branch of a national community-organizing group anchored in faith communities around the country. In the Bay Area they focus on housing and immigration. Opportunities include:

- Immigration Court. Accompany immigrants to their court hearings. You'll need at least conversational Spanish, and you'll be trained before you get started. For more information and the sign-up link: www.faithinactionba.org/accompaniment.
- Rapid Response Network (203) 666-4472: Faith in Action operates the San Mateo County Rapid Response phone network, providing information for immigrants and their supporters in the whole Bay Area, not just San Mateo. Call the number:
 - o If you or a loved one has been detained by ICE
 - o If you learn that someone has been detained by immigration enforcement
 - o If you see ICE activity in the community
 - o If you need accompaniment at an ICE Check-In or court appearance
 - o If you need support filling out your asylum paperwork within the first year of entering the country
 - o If you think immigration enforcement is contacting you by phone call or text message

Immigration court demonstrations and vigils: Several groups maintain a presence outside the immigration court at 100 Montgomery in downtown SF. Here are a couple:

Action Opportunity in Support of Trans Rights

Demand that Kaiser restore gender-affirming surgical care for trans youth

In an act of preemptive compliance, Kaiser Permanente announced on July 23 that they are suspending gender-affirming surgical care for patients under the age of 19 beginning August 29, 2025. The National Nurses Union has organized a protest against this decision and is inviting people to email Kaiser executives Maria Ansari and Ramin Davidoff, demanding that they restore care to all patients. Remembering Lovie Spencer

Our friends at St. Jude's Episcopal Church in Cupertino have shared that Lovie Spencer, who was a longtime St. Aidanite in the 1980s and 90s, has died. Several of us have been fortunate to see him in recent years when we have traveled to see the Guadalupe Play at San Juan Bautista. We will share the date of Lovie's service once it is scheduled. Here is St. Jude's message:

"With heavy hearts we announce the death of Lovie Spencer.

Lovie Spencer has long been a solid presence in the first row of pews every Sunday. His deep voice was often heard above the others as he sang the hymns he loved so much. Those of us who have attended the noon Good Friday Services won't forget his acapella rendition of "Take my Mother Home". His deep sonorous voice was poignantly moving. Lovie was named after his father and born in Indianola, Mississippi in 1940 to Lovie and Martha Spencer. Saturday, August 9th would have been his 85th birthday. He worked for thirty years in human resources in the hospitality business. His wishes were to be interred in the St. Jude's Memorial Garden. Services at St. Jude's are pending."
