

The Liturgy of the Word

Opening Acclamation

Christ Our Passover

Deacon Let us pray together,

Christ our Passover has been sacrificed for us; * therefore let us keep the feast,

- Not with the old leaven, the leaven of malice and evil, * but with the unleavened bread of sincerity and truth. Alleluia.
- Christ being raised from the dead will never die again; * death no longer has dominion.
- The death that Christ died was death to sin, once for all; * but the life Christ lives, is life to God.

The First Reading

Lector A reading from Acts (11:1-18).

Now the apostles and the believers who were in Judea heard that the Gentiles had also accepted the word of God. So when Peter went up to Jerusalem, the circumcised believers criticized him, saying,

"Why did you go to uncircumcised men and eat with them?" Then Peter began to explain it to them, step by step, saying, "I was in the city of Joppa praying, and in a trance I saw a vision. There was something like a large sheet coming down from heaven, being lowered by its four corners; and it came close to me. As I looked at it closely I saw four-footed animals, beasts of prey, reptiles, and birds of the air. I also heard a voice saying to me, 'Get up, Peter; kill and eat.' But I replied, 'By no means, Lord; for nothing profane or unclean has ever entered my mouth.' But a second time the voice answered from heaven, What God has made clean, you must not call profane.' This happened three times; then everything was pulled up again to heaven. At that very moment three men, sent to me from Caesarea, arrived at the house where we were. The Spirit told me to go with them and not to make a distinction between them and us. These six brothers also accompanied me, and we entered the man's house. He told us how he had seen the angel standing in his house and saying, 'Send to Joppa and bring Simon, who is called Peter; he will give you a message by which you and your entire household will be saved.' And as I began to speak, the Holy Spirit fell upon them just as it had upon us at the beginning. And I remembered the word of the Lord, how he had said, 'John baptized with water, but you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit.' If then God gave them the same gift that he gave us when we believed in the Lord Jesus Christ, who was I that I could hinder God?" When they heard this, they were silenced. And they praised God, saying, "Then God has given even to the Gentiles the repentance that leads to life."

"See, the home of God is among mortals. He will dwell with them as their God; they will be his peoples, and God himself will be with them; he will wipe every tear from their eyes. Death will be no more; mourning and crying and pain will be no more, for the first things have passed away."

And the one who was seated on the throne said, "See, I am making all things new." Also he said, "Write this, for these words are trustworthy and true." Then he said to me, "It is done! I am the Alpha and the Omega, the beginning and the end. To the thirsty I will give water as a gift from the spring of the water of life."

God of resurrection we pray for those who have died to this life, that they may be received in the splendor of your heavenly embrace.

Deacon or officiant reads the names of those who have recently died, inviting additional names

Like the women at the empty tomb,

We remember his words.

God of abundance, we give thanks for the progress of the Community Kitchen Capital Campaign and pray that our new kitchen will strengthen community and open up new opportunities for hospitality.

Deacon or officiant and invites additional thanksgivings and reads the names of those with birthdays in the coming week

We remember his words.

Creator and holder of all mysteries, we give thanks for the wonders of this world. Help us to be good stewards of the earth.

After supper Jesus took the cup of wine, said the blessing, gave it to his friends and said: "Drink this, all of you: this cup is the new Covenant in my Blood, poured out for you and for all for the forgiveness of sin. Do this for the remembrance of me."

And so, remembering all that was done for us: the cross, the tomb, the resurrection and ascension, longing for Christ's coming in glory, and presenting to you these gifts your earth has formed and human hands have made, we acclaim you, O Christ:

Presider and People Dying, you destroyed our death. Rising, you restored our life. Christ Jesus, come in glory!

Send your Holy Spirit upon us and upon these gifts of bread and wine that they may be to us the Body and Blood of your Christ. Grant that we, burning with your Spirit's power, may be a people of hope, justice and love. Giver of Life, draw us together in the Body of Christ, and in the fullness of time gather us with blessed Aidan and all your people into the joy of our true eternal home.

The Invitation

Lifting the bread and cup, the Presider invites the people, saying

Presider The gifts of God for the people of God. All are welcome at God's table.

This Altar belongs to God and all are welcome to partake, wherever you are on your journey of faith. If you choose to not receive the bread or wine, you are also welcome to come forward for a blessing; simply cross your arms over your chest.

The Bread and wine are shared with these words:

The Body of Christ, the bread of heaven. The Blood of Christ, the cup of salvation.

During Communion, those present via Zoom are encouraged to pray the following prayer for Spiritual Communion:

In union, O God, with your people at every altar of your Church, we offer you praise, giving thanks for your presence in the holy gifts of bread and wine. In our spatial distance we invite you to come spiritually into our hearts, nourishing and strengthening us as members of your body. Amen.

The Deacon or officiant removes the bread and wine from the table.

Post-Communion Prayer

Presider Let us pray.

God of abundance, you have fed us with the bread of life and cup of salvation; you have united us with Christ and one another; and you have made us one with all your people in heaven and on earth. Now send us forth in the power of your Spirit, that we may proclaim your redeeming love to the world and continue for ever in the risen life of Christ our Savior. Amen.

The people are invited to share a request for healing prayer. You may make a request for yourself or on behalf of another. The Presider then offers a prayer.

Community Kitchen Capital Campaign Update

The response of the St. Aidan's community to our proposal for a Community Kitchen has been truly amazing and heartwarming. The Kitchen Campaign dinner on April 5 turned into a grand celebration as we announced we were close to having the funds needed. Since the dinner, other pledges and gifts have come forth, and we are now confident that we can proceed with construction. At its April meeting, the vestry voted to go ahead and authorize the rector to enter into a contract with Midglen Studio. The next step will be to finalize drawings and apply for permits, with construction expected to start in the summer.

Now that we know we will have the funds for construction, we are beginning to flesh out what else we will need to go along with the new kitchen, such as utensils and furnishings for a fully functional kitchen, plus new storage to replace what we are losing in the existing space. In the weeks ahead, the Capital Campaign Committee will be contacting members who have not yet had an opportunity to pledge or make a donation to this transformative project. We hope everyone will want to be a part of this community effort.
